## Gann Crowned Homecoming Queen During Magic, Festive Weekend

Homecoming '81 is now a treasured memory, and as coordinator Jim Selbe put it, "unity" was the reason it was so successful.

"I couldn't have been more pleased!" Selbe said Sunday night. "The students played a greater role this year, it seemed. That is probably why the weekend went so well."

According to Selbe and others, several outstanding efforts made Homecoming '81 a huge success.

In the beauty and pageantry of the coronation, President E. Claude Gardner had the honor of crowning Kathy Gann as the 1981 Homecoming Queen. Kathy, a senior communications major, from Nashville, was ecstatic about the honor.

"I was happy ... and shocked ... I forgot I was supposed to stand up when President Gardner came toward me (as each of the candidates for queen had rehearsed). Both of the others are so wonderful...I was truly honored to even be in the court."

The daughter of Mrs. Mary F. Gann, Kathy was escorted by her fiance', Phil Meadows.

As if a beautiful queen was not enough, Charles Smith's team toyed with Lee College until the second half, only to demolish them in the end, 87-71.

Playing to a 38-38 deadlock at the half, F-HC outscored the Vikings 49-33 in the second half. Garrett Grills, a sophomore from Detroit, MI, had 27 points for the victors.

Entertainment-wise, parents and prospective students, in addition to alumni and students, saw the Homecoming theatre production, "Dracula" and the annual "Showcase," featuring all of the college's traveling groups. Topping the day off was Phi Kappa's "Hootenanny," with F-HC's Lanny Hall and the River Bluff Clan from Memphis providing a sufficient dose of "rock and roll."

The Homecoming parade, always a highlight, featured Sigma Rho's float, "Queen Sigma," this year's first place winner. In addition, TAG received second place for "The Great Train Robbery," and the Student Alumri Association placed third with "Treasured Memories, New Beginnings," a tribute to the 1981 Homecoming Court.

Building a float was secondary to SAA's other responsibilities, which were all encompassed under the title of "Official Hosts and Hostesses for Homecoming." SAA President Jeff Curry said "everything went smooth."

"There never seemed to be a problem with moving from one thing to another. Everyone (the visitors) seemed to know what was happening next."

SAA Vice President Kathy Mullins had a special part in the day--planning and coordinating the coronation. "I may be a little prejudiced," Mullins said, "But I think it was beautiful."

SAA was also in charge of class reunions, which this year included the school's first five-year reunion since being accredited in 1976 as a four-year institution.

Curry and Selbe both had high praise for one particular unit--Hill Food Service.

"Hill Food Service really outdid themselves this weekend," Selbe said.

"The 'Down-On-The-River Feast' was a highlight of Saturday night," Curry added.

An unusually large crowd attended Homecoming Chapel, so large in fact that many people had to sit in the balcony sections. David Sain, minister of the Wood Avenue Church of Christ, Florence, AL, was the speaker. Garland Elkins of Memphis was awarded the "Outstanding Alumnus of the Year."

He also praised Billy Smith and the Admissions staff for their excellent work in housing prospective students.

"It was just a total effort," Selbe said.

#### Dracula' Provides Adventure By Amy Elam

Dracula opened with a literal bang on the F-HC stage last Thursday night.

Although the plot was slow in the beginning, the arrival of Abraham von Helsing, portrayed by Robert King, quickened the action. King rendered an excellent performance, making von Helsing seem human and fallible, while yet such a powerful force for good that he could resist the terrible powers of Dracula. The character had depth, and King's delivery made the sometimes difficult speeches easy to understand.

In his stage debut, Mark Page's striking appearance and his awesome stage presence helped overcome the obvious Southern influence on the Transylvanian count SophomoreJulie Marshall, as the heroine Lucy Seward, turned in a steady performance also.

The roles of Jonathan Harker and Dr. Seward were portrayed by actors Bill Teague and Ray Eaton. These roles, which served as a catalyst and backdrop for much of the action, occasionally were hounded by wordiness, but usually they managed to rally to the effort required to overcome it.

In the area of performance, however, James Radford's role as the demon-hounded lunatic. Renfield, carried the show. In a part that could easily be overplayed or left to wither, Radford's balanced portrayal of the schizorphrenic gave the show vitality and action and the audience loved it.

Special effects were utilized to an extent not seen in the recent past on the F-HC stage. They provided an excellent show for the audience, an interesting and different approach to theater that shows great promise for the future. The use of specially arranged synthesizer and audio effects provided both a moodsetting device and a production F-HC can proudly call

The audience was caught up in the drama of the evening, as evidenced by the obvious sounds of relief heard during intermissions and comedic episodes. That is the judge of the evening, for the judge of a production is the enjoyment of its audience, and the audience enjoyed.

### Student Participation May Key \$100 Benefit Dinner Success

Others are more interested in another side of Thanksgiving. "I plan to go home and 'gorge' myself on some good food," says Terry Smith, also a freshman.



Freshman Mac Abston led all F-HC scorers with 18 points. Tony Wandall contributed 16 points while pulling down 7 rebounds. Garrett Grills and Randall Avery both scored 12 points each.

### Lions Whip Lee College Before Capacity Crowd

Garrett Grills, sophomore out of Detroit, Michigan, poured in 27 points and grabbed rebounds to lead the F-HC Lions over Lee College, 87-71.

Lee College, located in Cleveland, Tennessee, played rough with the Lions the first half. Getting it inside to their big men, they were tied with F-HC at intermission 38-38.

Early in the second half, however, it became apparent that F-HC had taken control. Garrett Grills pulled down an offensive rebound, leaped heavenward, and slammed it home to turn the game around for good. The Lions went on to build up as much as a 20 point lead, as the fired-up Homecoming crowd cheered them on.


Complimenting Grills in the scoring effort were Randall Avery with 17 points and Sacher Dawson with 14 points.
