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Kennedy Assassination Probed Tuesday

On November 8 Freed-Hardeman College will offer a free presentation entitled "Who Killed JFK?", a program of slides and film on the controversial Dallas assassination. It will be held in the banquet hall of the Bible-Communication-World Evangelism Building at 7:30 p.m.

The speaker for the event will be Carl Oglesby of the Assassination Information Bureau, a public-education organization which helped bring about and then monitored the 1978 congressional investigation into the murder.

Oglesby has taught politics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Antioch and Dartmouth Universities. He has held visiting fellowships at the Aspen Institute for Humanistic Studies and the Hutchins Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions in Santa Barbara. Oglesby has published three books on political themes, the most recent of which is *The Yankee and the Cowboy War* (1977), an original interpretation of the murder of Kennedy and the forced resignation of Nixon. His writings on politics have appeared in such journals as *Life*, *The Nation*, the *Washington Post*, and the *Boston Globe*.

"Few people know that this investigation found that Kennedy was probably

killed by a conspiracy," asserts Oglesby. "We know that Oswald was not alone, and we know that Jack Ruby had help in silencing him. Now more than ever, it's important for ordinary citizens to understand what happened in Dallas."

The Freed-Hardeman College men's basketball team will open their Volunteer State Athletic Conference schedule against the Lambuth Eagles in the annual Homecoming game Saturday, November 12, at 2:45 in Bader Memorial Gymnasium.

The Lions are slated to play Athens State in Athens, Alabama in a non-conference game Thursday, November 10, to start off the season.

The team has been preparing for the season with a number of scrimmages with mixed results, according to Coach Charles Smith. "At times we've looked

real good and at other times we've looked so-so. To be successful we have to get mentally and physically tougher."

Leading the Lions into action will be seniors Randall Avery and Garrett Grills. Avery led the team with 17 points and 5 assists per game last year to earn a spot on the VSAC All-West team while Grills added 15.8 points and a team-leading 7.3 rebounds per game.

Avery and Grills are co-captains this year and Coach Smith is expecting them to supply leadership, saying, "Garrett and Randall are seniors and have been a vital part of the program the last four years. The leadership they show on the court will dictate how well the team does this year."
