## Buddy Program unites college, community

President Gardner once said in chapel that college students can be some of the Ionliest people. It's a fact--no matter what our age we all need somebody to care, listen, be with and relate to. A program on campus which recognizes that need in others and strives to fulfill it is the Buddy Program.

The Buddy Program, which is run locally by Pat Sumrall of the Chester County Juvenile Court and campus coordinator Darrell Sharp, is the biggest it has ever been. It consists of 55 college students and 35 Chester County junior and senior high students. The program is a preventive group which helps young people and attempts to meet their needs.

According to Sharp, each college buddy is asked to contact his high school buddy three times a week either by writing, calling or visiting them. College men are given junior high or high school boys to contact, and college women are assigned to the girls. Every two weeks the volunteers then report what contact has been made to Sharp.

"One aspect of the program is social club involvement. Each club has consented to do a project for the Buddy Program throughout the year. Philo sponsored a get acquainted party on October 1, and Lambda Delta

Phi had a Halloween party for us on Tuesday night. Tri Zeta and Sigma Rho are co-sponsoring a Thanksgiving dinner, and Phi Kappa Alpha plans to have a Christmas party for us. Plans for other social club projects are still in the making. This spring we do hope to have a carnival with all the social clubs helping with it," Sharp explained.

Besides giving their time and talents to create special occasions for the young people participating in the program, the volunteers also give themselves. They try to follow a set of

guidelines when interacting with their younger-age buddies. These guidelines aren't just restricted to program use but can serve as a refreshing reminder of how we should act toward others each day.

1. Be a good listener. Don't talk too much. One of the best ways to help someone is just to listen to what they're saying. Respect can be gained by listening. Communication gaps can be bridged by owning a good ear.

2. Don't pass judgment. Be objective. Not everyone owns the

same set of values you do.

3. Respect confidentiality. The character of a person is not an open topic for gossip.

4. Be supportive. Lift up someone when they're down and keep them going when they're up.

 Be a good example. We need to represent that which is basically good and right. Actions speak louder than words.

6. Give attention, affection and love. Show someone you care and say it too. It's not always easy to love those who need it the most, but the rewards are there if you care.

 Don't have prejudice. Don't let your prejudices run your life and control your thoughts and actions.


8. Present your ideas clearly and simply. Say what you mean and mean what you say. Never say anything you don't intend to back up.







#### Legends bid for return to charts

music critic Rock music is full of legendary figures. One legendary artist and one legendary group have recently released ne commotion in artist is Bruce is Pink Floyd. released new albums causing a commotion in the music world. The artist is Bruce Springsteen, the group

Bruce Springsteen is the current epitome of rock music. No frills, no games, no gadets, no nonsense. Bruce tore down the Top 40 barrier with his 1984 album, Born in the U.S.A. and strengthened his grip on the title of "Boss" by dominating the charts for several weeks last fall when he released a live five album set. This some to bring home another winner in Tunnel of Love. time around Bruce changes direction

Tunnel of Love is an album about relationships. Most songs deal with the tried-and-true romantic relationship theme. Some of them deal with it almost flippantly such as "Ain't Got You" or "All that Heaven Will Allow." Others cut to the bone such as the sad "One Step Up," the lead-off single "Brilliant Disguise" or the "Valentine's Day." chilling Springsteen, known for his songs about the working man, can surely teach some Top 40 songwriters the right way to write a song. The lyrics on Tunnel of Love are superb. Bruce can tell a story like few others have been able to do.

Musically, Tunnel of Love may surprise those who just jumped on Springsteen's bandwagon after the Born in the U.S.A. album. The music, like much of the lyrical content, is

reflective. A few of the songs bring to mind Springsteen's 1982 acoustic album Nebraska. Several of the songs on the new album also sound similar to the single "My Hometown." Springsteen's E Street Band performs on the album but only sparingly. Most of the work on this album is done by Springsteen. I strongly suggest you grab a copy of Tunnel of Love and give it a spin. It may not be become Bruce's biggest seller, but it is worthy of becoming so.

Pink Floyd has been around for 20 years, and their music is still as important today as it was when it first started. Their new album is titled A Momentary Lapse of Reason. It is the group's first album since Roger Waters left the group to go solo. Pink Floyd is known for the incredible Dark Side of the Moon and The Wall albums. Although Waters has left the group, Pink Floyd does not hurt on A Momentary Lapse of Reason.

This album begins with an instrumental, "Signs of Life" which promptly segues into their first single "Learning to Fly." There is no new formula employed by the group on this album. It sounds like Pink Floyd, which is good considering no one alse can sound like Pink Floyd. Notable cuts include include "One Slip" and "On the Turning Away." If you like rock music you can mellow out to while still fulfilling that need to slowly rock your eyebrows away, Pink Floyd's latest is what you need.
