Students and friends of Freed-Hardeman should be happy to know that the foundation of the college is becoming stronger every year. The reorganization of the administration has placed five men with over eighty years of experience into key positions and has drawn other talented members of the administration into various roles of decision-making.

The structural change in the administration was prompted by the welcomed growth of the student body. President E. Claude Gardner has been thinking about making these changes for the last few years and has now decided that it would be in the best interest of the college to change at this time. Another factor

prompting the adjustment in administrative duties was to protect the college from being crippled in the event that some key administrators were no longer able to serve the college. Vice President Milton Sewell said, "We have all been concerned about the roles of key administrators. If you have too many responsibilities on too few key administrators, the organization breaks down if there is an accident, tragedy of something that interferes with that person's effectiveness or work. As a result there has been a diffusion. The president has delegated much authority and responsibility to his vice presidents ... it has taken some of the burden off the president so that he can deal with things that a president ought to deal with." Vice Presidents Brad Brumley, Reeder Oldham, Milton Sewell, David Thomas and Jess M. Wilcoxson will help relieve President Gardner with the awesome responsibility of providing a quality education in a Christian atmosphere.

The decision made by President Gardner to ap-

point these five men to more demanding positions offers these benefits. It has involved additional talented persons in operating the college, thus ensuring experienced leadership in time of crisis. It has enabled a valuable resource (experienced administrators) to be used in a more productive way. It has provided security for the future and soundness for the present. Also these

men are now able to deal mainly with the important issues besieging the college without losing their rapport with the students.

Freed-Hardeman College depends greatly on these men. Without them the engine of Freed-Hardeman would grind to a screeching halt. But what does Freed-Hardeman mean to these men? Vice President Sewell summed it up well when he said, "It is our life."

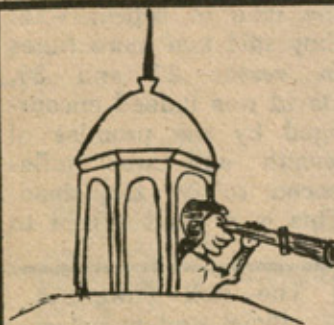

## Since You Asked

1. Q. A Supplement to the Catalog was issued during the summer that seemed to imply that the women would be able to visit the men's residence halls, and yet there has been no mention of a rule change and the rules in the student handbook read the same. Is there a specified time when the women can visit the men's residence halls on a regular basis?

A. The supplement reads, "The Dean of Students, in cooperation with the residence hall supervisors, will arrange specified times when the women may visit the lobbies of the men's residence halls." According to Dean Murphey, the Dean of Students, the policy is the same. There will be no specific hours for women to make visits. There will, however, be certain special occasions in which the women might make such visits (such as Sadie Hawkins Day, GPA week, etc.). These occasions may be more frequent in the future.

2. Q. What is the \$15.00 parking fee used for?

A. The fee that Freed-Hardeman charges is minimal in comparison with the fees that some institutions charge, some up to \$35.00 and even higher. According to Lawrence Taylor, the money that is paid the school is used for employment of a security officer for the parking lot and is also used for maintenance of the parking facilities.

The employment of a security officer is an obvious necessity. Concerning the maintenance, Taylor states that the potholes were temporarily re-filled this summer. Unfortunately, there was a great deal of rain and the filling was washed away. The administration is understandably reluctant to spend a great deal of money for maintenance on the parking facilities between the library and Bader Gym because they hope that within the school year the lots will all be torn out in the campus beautification project to make way for the new plaza and grassy areas.

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## Have You Noticed The Changes?

This year several rule changes were made in an effort to benefit and please the students. In the dorms, room check by the resident assistants and dormitory mothers was changed from the necessity of being in your room to the convenience of merely being somewhere on your hall.

Steve Lucas, the student body president, said this rule was made specifically for the convenience of the students. It was a procedural change on a trial basis, and Dean of Students James Murphy believed this rule would possibly help on flexibility for the students.

Before this fall, it was necessary to sign out of the dormitory everytime you left campus or went to any event as a date. This year the rule has been changed to signing out only on overnight occasions. Special permission must be obtained by clubs, classes and groups when activities extend beyond the hours of curfew. Students must sign a sheet in their dorm before leaving for that event. This allows the supervisors of each dormitory to know who is gone, and saves each person from having to obtain special permission!

Upperclassmen are now allowed to sign out between 11:00 p.m. and

11:45 p.m. This policy allows more convenience for the upperclassmen and lets them check in and out with the monitors.

Rules and policies change when the recommendations by the student council are approved by the administration. The new parental permission card proved the students are not totally regulated by the school. A student's actions are not reported periodically to his parents. To some, this may indicate a beneficial change since a student is allowed to make more of his own decisions and be responsible for his own actions.

During the summer, a catalog supplement which was mailed to students misled many into believing women would be allowed in the men's residence halls. It stated there would be specified times arranged for women to visit the lobbies of the men's residence halls. Many students thought this would become a permanent arrangement, but the rule was referring to specific events such as "Sadie Hawkins".

A restriction on where "spot cards" could be played was lifted. Therefore, this allows students to play cards in the

student center and other areas outside of the dormitories.

The rule concerning the loss of an I.D. card remains the same as last year. A student must pay cash until a new card is received. Then the receipts for paid meals may be taken to the cafeteria manager for an 80 percent cash refund. As a result of inflation, replacement I.D. cards will cost \$7.00.

Any student planning to be married must notify the Office of the Dean of Students two weeks prior to the marriage. Any secret marriages will be subject to review by the committee on student guidance. This rule was made to provide housing for these married students. The administration did not create the rule in order to approve or disapprove of marriages. It was made to prevent married couples from living apart in the dorms during the week and then spending their weekends elsewhere.

When asked about the many rule changes, some students said they agreed the changes were more convenient. Many were in favor of a possible "open house" in the men's residence halls one weekend, so women could see "how the other half lives."

## Facility To Be Converted Into New Recreation Room

"Let's run over to Ping-pong Hall," a student in the early 50's might have said. "Ping-pong Hall" was what is now the nurse's station. In the late 50's the student center moved to the basement of Dixon Hall. And yes, it was open to all students. Our present student center was completed in 1966 and has served us ever since.

Plans are now underway for a new student activities center for Freed-Hardeman students. The proposed site is the former location of Arnold's Air Conditioning, a warehouse-type building by the new football field and tennis courts. Jo Len Askew, Director of Student Activities stated, "It's kind of off the beaten path, but when you consider the size of many campuses, it's not that far off."

Football, air hockey, ping pong, and pool tables will be placed in the large open area of the center. A section will be set apart with card tables. Rooms at the back of the game area would ideally be made into a handball court, but that is definitely something for the future.

A smaller area next to the game room will be divided into a kitchen, lounge, office and bathroom. An open counter will possibly be cut into the wall so that the kitchen will open out onto the game room. The kitchen will be a place for social clubs and dormitories to cook and have bake sales. It will also make the center a good place to hold club parties. A

plate glass window separating the lounge and game room would allow one to see what is going on. The lounge will not just be a place to laze around in. A monitor will be on duty there at all times. This is also where equipment for the games will be rented. ID's probably will be kept while the equipment is out to insure that it is returned in good condition. Miss Askew's office will be located here.

There is no set date for the center's completion. The building needs a lot of work and furnishings. As in any project, there are obstacles to overcome. For now, we have one more coming attraction on the campus.

## Plan To Be Realized In College's Future

Students arrived upon the campus of F-HC and notice various changes. Immediately several questions come to mind. What happened to the tennis courts? What is the new smell? What is going to be done about the potholes? Are the steps taken so far the end result?

After these questions have lingered in the mind for several days, a presentation was made in chapel explaining the Beautification Plan in progress. Total estimated cost of the plan was given a preliminary estimate of over one-half million dollars.

The key element for the total project is time. Projects take money and fund-raising efforts take time.

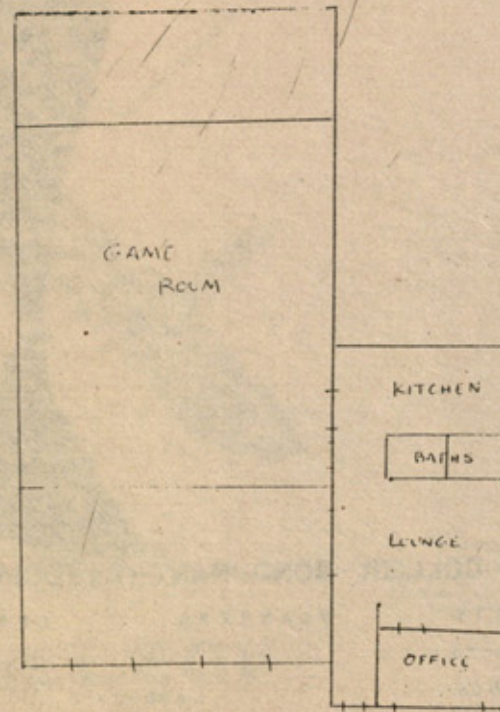
Some of the improvements include: A fountain to be erected in front of the Lowden-Daniel Library, a plaza to be built in front of the Bader Gym, and various shrubs and flowers to be strategically situated around the campus.

What has been done? The tennis courts have been torn down. Planters have been erected which cost an estimate of \$5,000. These planters will probably be used on another part of the campus when the fountain is installed.

The potholes located near the gym will be fixed when more money is raised to complete this project. President Gardner commented, however, "Potholes are just a common thing in highways. They will be filled from time to time." Eventually, the gym area will be transformed into various shrubs and greenery.

When will all the improvements be completed? There is no estimated date of completion.

President Gardner further commented, "The school has been planning this project for years." The whole project will be a remarkable improvement. However, little things like potholes need to be repaired now.



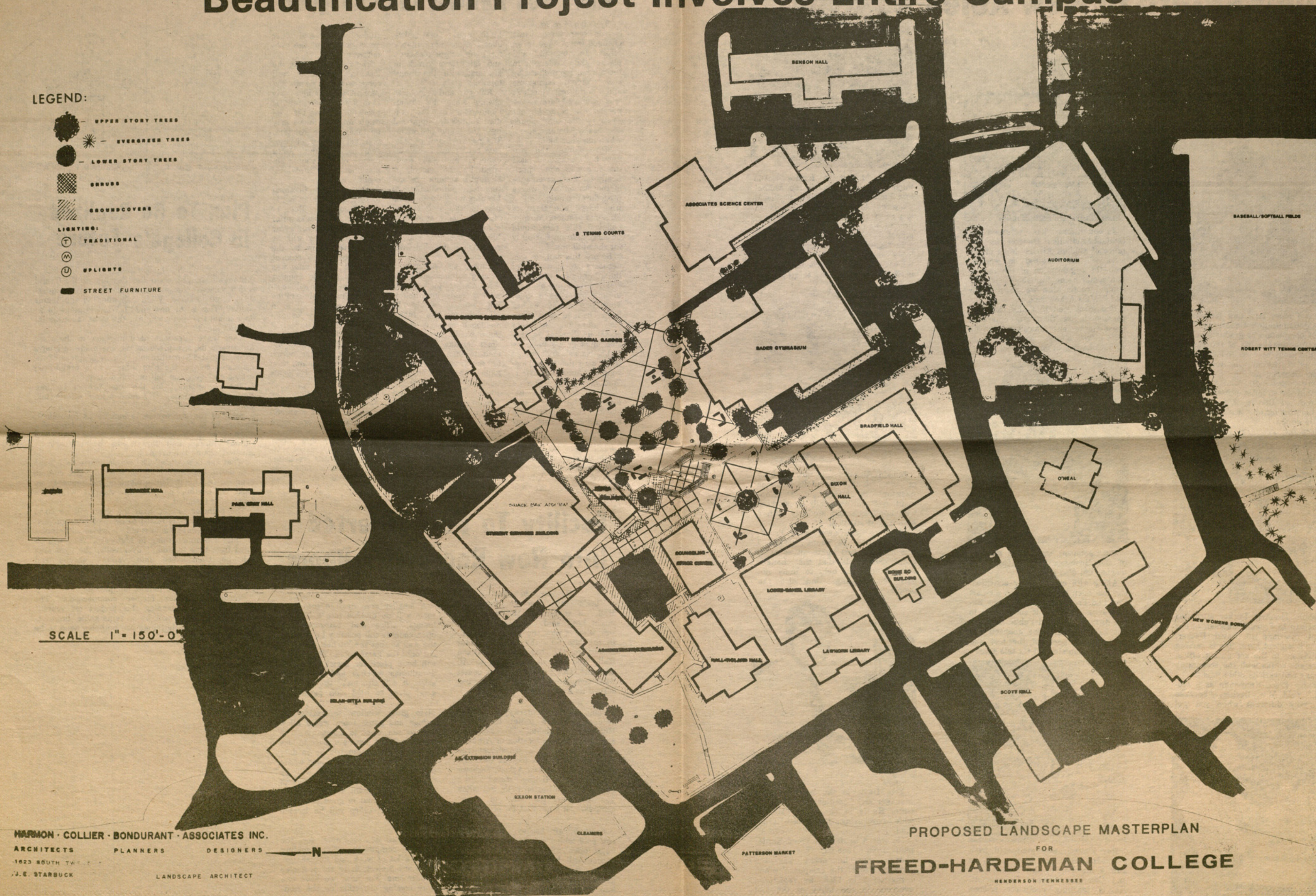

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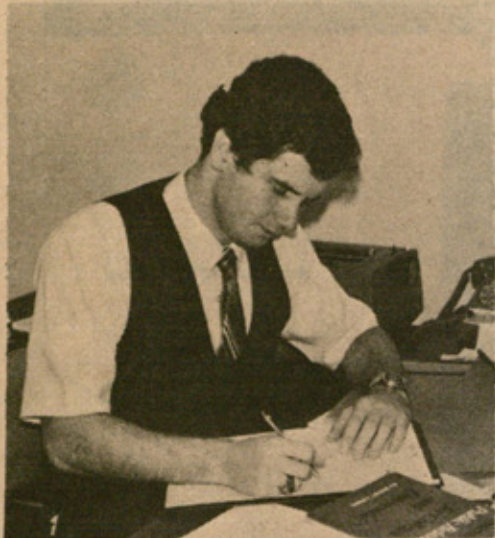

"Enjoy Freed-Hardeman as a student," said Mrs. Decker, "because it's really different when you get out."



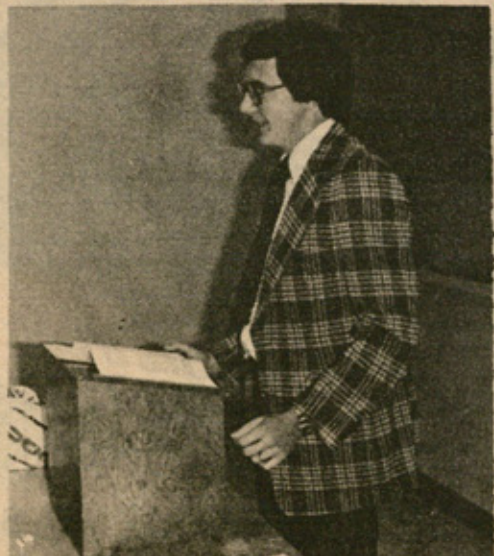

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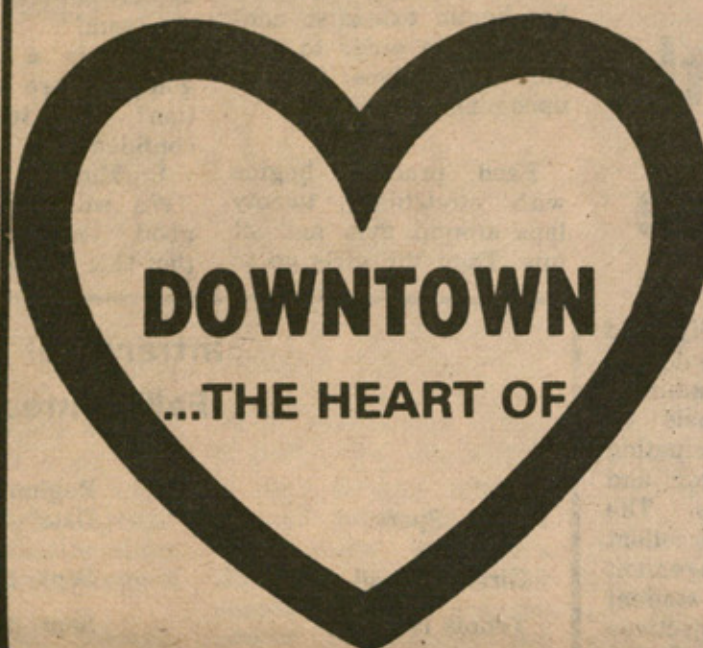
