Having now successfully enlightened your delicate minds and run out of space to fill, I perceive that Pope was right after all, "Drink deep or taste not the Pierian Spring."

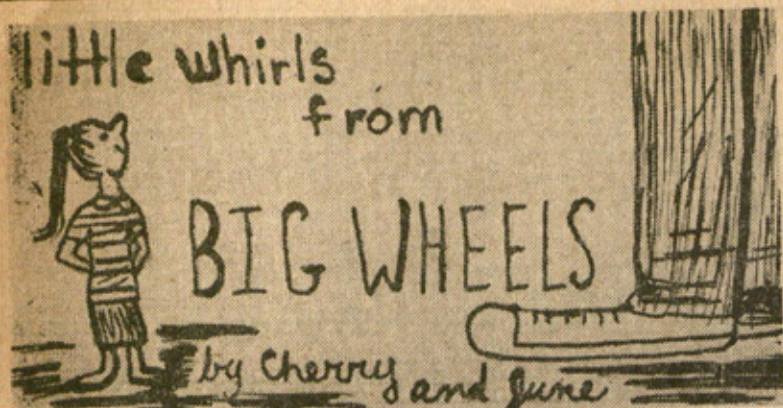

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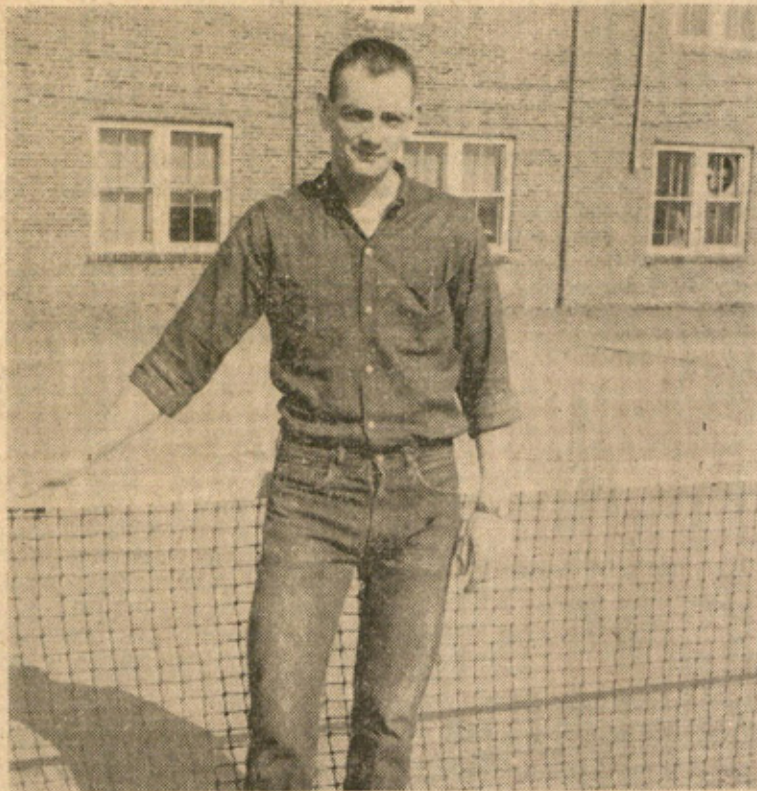
