# Challenges!

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# 'TENNIS-ITIS' IS AFFLICTING FHC GIRLS TOO!

## Scorekeeper's Summary

Everyone will agree that this year has been a good year for Freed-Hardeman on the hardwoods. We were well represented throughout the year, not only in victories but in sportsmanship. The Lions had a 13-11 record which within itself was a credit to the school. Now that the season is over we can give a final run down on the factors that made this year successful. They are as follows:

Charles Dowdy in 23 games rolled up 494 points. In doing this he shot .412 percent from the field and .806 percent from the foul line. He has 216 rebounds, 26 stolen balls and 14 assists to his credit.

Bobby Hauser in 23 games has a total of 341 points. Bobby shot .416 percent from the field and .763 percent from the foul line. He has 95 rebounds, 31 stolen balls and 39 assists to his credit.

Buddy May in 23 games has sunk 178 points through the hoop. He has a .396 percent from the field and .621 percent from the line. Also in his favor are 45 rebounds, 14 stolen balls and 35 assists.

Pete Beecham in 23 games has

a total of 233 points. Pete shot .381 from the field and .589 percent from the foul line. He took down 189 rebounds, stole the ball 38 times and assisted 65 times.

Roger Hubbard in 21 games has a total of 161 points. Roger shot .299 per cent from the field and .740 per cent from the line. He has 140 rebounds, 27 stolen balls and 41 assists to his credit.

Robert Fields in 22 games has scored a total of 57 points. Robert has .249 per cent from the field and .629 per cent from the foul line. He has 84 rebounds, 6 stolen balls and 12 assists.

Dan Henry in 21 games has a total of 105 points for the season. He has shot .360 per cent from the field and .390 per cent from the foul line. Dan has 130 rebounds, 5 stolen balls and 2 assists to his credit.

Sammy Fisher in 17 games has a total of 25 points by shooting .229 per cent from the court and .643 per cent from the foul line. He has 5 rebounds, 4 stolen balls and 12 assists.

Harold Neal in 10 games has 13 points by shooting .211 from the field and 100 percent from the line. He has 1 rebound, 2 stolen balls and 3 assists to his credit.

Ed Nulter in one game failed to score.

Karl Johnson in 4 games failed to score though he took 8 rebounds.

The team as a whole scored 1467 points this year. They shot .373 per cent from the field and had a .676 per cent from the foul line. All we can add to this fine record is our thanks for representing us so well.
