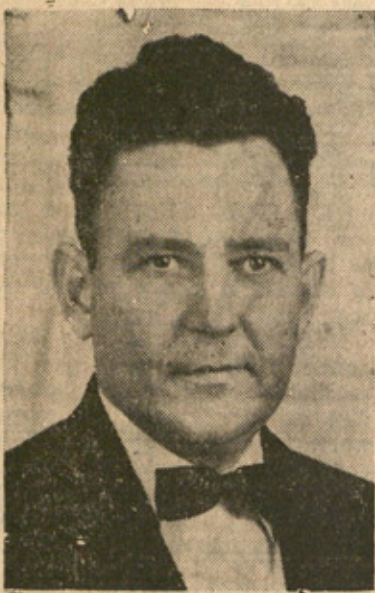

Big Plans For High School Day

On High School Day, March 18, at Freed-Hardeman College, Henderson, Tennessee, Dr. Selton D. Feurt will be the featured speaker. Dr. Feurt, Dean of the College of Pharmacy of the University of Tennessee, Memphis, Tennessee, will discuss at 2 p.m. "Research Contributions by the Allied Health Professions". His address will be correlated with the emphasis the college is giving its pre-professional curriculums. Freed-Hardeman College offers pre-professional curriculums that prepare students for the professional schools such as pre-medical, pre-medical technology, pre-pharmacy, pre-dental and pre-nursing.

Dr. Feurt graduated with a B.S. in pharmacy from Loyola University and he received the master's degree and doctorate in pharmacology from the University of Florida. From 1953-58 he was associate professor of pharmacology - pharmacognosy at the University of Georgia. He is listed in Who's Who in the South and in American Men of Science. He holds membership

Chorus Makes Trips

Shortly after the noon hour on Monday, February 23, the chorus left for Jasper, Alabama. That night, after a fabulous pot-luck dinner, the chorus presented a program of religious numbers to climax the annual alumni banquet held at the Sixth Street church building where Gus Nichols preaches. There were approximately 500 present at this meeting. After the program, members of the chorus enjoyed overnight visits in various homes of members of the congregation.

At eight o'clock the following morning, the chorus presented a thirty minute radio program on Station WWSB, which has a listening audience of approximately 20,000. Then at ten o'clock, the chorus appeared at the high school where a program of both spiritual and secular numbers was given. Following a fine noon meal in the high school cafeteria, the chorus made a 30 minute radio appearance on Station WARF.

Late Tuesday afternoon, a tired but happy group returned to the FHC campus telling of fine hospitality and fellowship, beautiful weather, delicious food, and successful programs which equalled a grand experience in Jasper, Alabama.

March 4 was a big day for the FHC chorus. The chorus was featured at the annual convention of the American Association of Junior Colleges at Louisville, Kentucky. Hotel Sheraton was the scene of the program which included the following numbers: "Lamb of God", "Hallelujah Amen", "My God and I", "A Legend", "Deep River", "The Erie Canal", "Lolly Tu-Dum", and "Go, Song of Mine!" A featured speaker at this fortieth anniversary banquet was the Honorable Arthur S. Fleming, Secretary, U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Dean Gardner attended the convention which began on March 2. Freed-Hardeman became a member of the American Association of Junior Colleges in 1925.

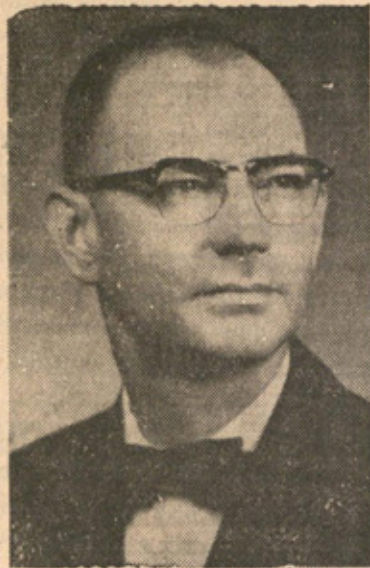
Wanted - By The F. B. I.

The second event of the FHC artist series will be on Monday evening, March 21. Charles P. Roland, the son of Vice-President C. P. Roland, will deliver a lecture on Albert Sidney Johnston.

Dr. Roland attended grade school, high school, and Freed-Hardeman College at Henderson, Tennessee. He became interested in the study of history while here at Freed-Hardeman and majored in history at Vanderbilt where he received his B.A. Degree.

For more than four years of World War II, Dr. Roland served in the Ninety-ninth Infantry Division of the Army. In the European Theater of Operations, he served as combat infantry captain. He saw action in two of the most important campaigns, the Belgium Bulge and the Remagen Bridgehead actions.
