
Speaking of the election, Ronald says: "Of course, I am very happy to have been elected. So far every quarter has been better than the preceding one and I am really looking forward to next year."

Answering the call was minor thing. They have all spent many long hours on the athletic field conditioning themselves for the meet. We know they will represent Freed-Hardeman in a manner that will command respect from everyone.

Again this year there will be only one meet but we hope in the future years to build the track team up into a very active sport with a full schedule.

Thus far the tennis team has made a very respectable showing by winning five matches out of eight. They have but one match left so we can chalk up another successful year for the FHC tennis team. This score will be added to the record registered by FHC in the nine years that tennis has been an intercollegiate sport. Under Coach Witt the previous teams have compiled 43 wins to 22 losses and one tie record. This is remarkable as it stands. But when you realize this was gained over senior colleges this record looks even better.

The individual scoring thus far is as follows: Evanson and Brackeen, playing in one and two positions respectively, have each won five while dropping three. It seems as Evanson and Brackeen go so goes the team as this is the team record. Channell, playing in position three, has a four-four record. England, who started the season in fourth position but was moved to sixth due to illness, has a three-one record. Neal, who has played fourth and fifth position, has a record of six-two. Boylen, playing fifth and sixth position, has posted three wins against that many defeats and John Bowen, who has also played in both fifth and sixth position has a four-two record.
