Freed-Hardeman College will award 71 graduates the Associate in Arts degree on June 5. The graduation exercises will begin at 10 a.m. at the Henderson Church of Christ with the baccalaureate sermon delivered by B. C. Goodpasture, minister and editor of the Gospel Advocate, Nashville, Tennessee. At 2 p.m. Dr. J. A. Barksdale, Dean of Tennessee Polytechnic Institute, Cookeville, Tennessee, will deliver the Commencement address in the college auditorium. At the commencement exercises the awards and scholarships will be announced by college officials. The graduation exercise will mark the end of the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the college. Through the year the college has celebrated "fifty golden years of Christian education."

It all began in September, 1956. A new class enrolled at FHC.

Jr.-Sr. Banquet Big Event of 1924, 1958

There was quite a difference in the Junior-Senior Banquet which was held Thursday night, May 8 and the first one to be held at Freed-Hardeman College March 18, 1924.

The 1958 banquet was held at the New Southern Hotel in Jackson, Tennessee. After the welcoming speech by Dan Jenkins, Junior Class President, a three course dinner was served. Other speeches, after dinner, were made by Lee Beckett, Senior Class President, Calvin Conn, President of the Student Body and Bob Fulmer, C. P. Roland, Vice President of Freed-Hardeman College described the first Junior-Senior Banquet. The program was concluded with a prayer.

Dinner music was furnished by Phil Evanson and Yoshio Inamoto. Entertainment was by the Freed-Hardeman College quartet, composed of Don Brackin, Pat Phillips, Jimmy Williams and Yoshio Inamoto.

The first Freed-Hardeman College Junior-Senior Banquet took place at the Woodward Hotel, south of Main Street, on the west side of the overhead bridge, Henderson, Tennessee. The guests assembled at the west entrance of Oakland Hall and went together to the hotel. After a four-course dinner, speeches were made by the class presidents and C. P. Roland, sponsor of the 1924 Junior class.

Following the speeches the group went to the home of Ben McCann, a member of the 1924 junior class, who made the arrangements for the banquet. Here they had other social features of games, contests, roasting marshmallows, etc.

The phone hadn't been connected for two weeks.

As he lifted the receiver a woman's bookish voice said, "I don't care if they do graduate this year. They mustn't make noise in the library."

This meant, "This is Gierheart. A time bomb is planted in the lobby of the ad building. If all goes as planned, the roof will be raised immediately following commencement."

He replied, "Someone stole Witt's magic rabbit. He didn't see or hear the thief. He's suspicious of no one. Do you think you can catch the rabbit?"

"Sure."

The seniors selected Bradford. They weren't sure he stole the diplomas. They had only one small clue. Two rabbits ears were sticking out of his coat pocket and he kept saying, "Hand them out! Hand them out!"
